















How might this instructor improve their teaching effectiveness?

Comment

She might prep the class better for smaller discussions or warn students that their participation will be expected more at the beginning of the semester. I think the expectation was that it would be a lecture style, which would have been effective, however the smaller class size made it more conducive to integrated discussion as well (which did happen throughout the semester). The class was excellent but it did take some adjustment to incorporate a discussion aspect.

Feel like reading was too much

less reading, less discussion, or at least organize it better so that only 3 people for china are the only students participating

I would suggest Professor Baggott Carter upload the readings at least two days before classes, or even to upload all of them at the beginning of the semester, just so that students may have more latitude in scheduling time to read them. Also, I have taken a couple of classes on China and East Asia before taking this class, so I had no problem immediately adapting to the pace of the class, but I noticed that some of my classmates were overwhelmed by the amount of information contained in the lectures, especially the first couple of classes (i.e. the IR theory). I would suggest that Professor Carter slows down a little for students coming from non-Chinese background or non-IR background.

More class discussions

More notice between the time assignments are given and the due dates

I think if the weekly reading assignments can be reduced to 100-page-ish, it would be much nicer. There were some weeks when I felt that I was never be able to finish all the assigned readings before class (because I am juggling four reading-intense classes this semester). But in hindsight, it was a great training in speed reading.

-Avoid "surprise" debates or last minute assignments(i.e. crisis simulation). Although it is understood that the intent is to simulate a real crisis, it ends up becoming more stressful for students who have other assignments on their plate that same week. Additionally, students are not able to benefit as much when they lack time to fully prepare.

-Because many of the students use background knowledge or research to contribute to discussions, and taking consideration into the fact that the midterm and final exam is graded based on references from the readings or lecture, it would be helpful if the professor provides her own answers at the end of discussions.
